
Dear Friends,

When the opportunity to serve on the ministry staff at St Michael's arose this fall, and everything fell into place in a few weeks time, it felt to me like pure gift from God. I am thrilled to be serving here as Director of Family Ministries, joining a wonderful ministry team – both new and continuing staff, ordained and lay.

My family had chosen to worship regularly at St. Michael's over the past year. My husband and I wanted to raise our sons in a diverse and welcoming community that truly strives to live the gospel message of inclusion and love. My sons enjoyed the children's ministries. Just being able to worship here with our three energetic young boys and feel that they were truly welcome to be their busy, sometimes noisy selves, was a gift for us.

Now I have the privilege of overseeing and, God willing, expanding St. Michael's ministries with children, youth and their families. Francesca MacDowell will be assisting me in this role, and we are committed to supporting our current ministries of Children's Chapel, Godly Play, Seasons of the Spirit, and the various youth classes that make up the Journey to Adulthood program. We want to provide youth with opportunities for meaningful service and community-building activities, including travel experiences. We are preparing a second Godly Play room for 2nd-4th graders, and hope to set aside dedicated space for our youth to feel "at home" here at church. All of this was begun long before I arrived, and wouldn't be possible without a cadre of committed and gifted volunteers at all levels. And we need more help!

Another area I hope to grow is our support to parents and families. I have found parenting to be more challenging than I had ever imagined, and I think I am not the only parent who feels that way. I look forward to finding ways to provide meaningful



support for parents at all stages of their journey – in groups, classes, family events, or whatever meets the needs of our community.

St. Michael's is in the midst of significant change, as we say goodbye to Father Christopher and a new clergy staff comes on board. Times like this can bring grief and stress; but they are also moments of great opportunity and promise. We know that St Michael's has many gifts and resources: beautiful and meaningful worship; a practice of welcome; deep involvement in prayer and spiritual tradition; lovely spaces, both new and old; and, mostly, amazing and gifted people of all ages. Together, and with the power of God's Spirit at work in us, I believe we can indeed accomplish things we can only begin to imagine as we strive to nurture all the generations of our community in the Christian faith. May we always seek to follow where God leads and share God's love with all the people who come through our doors.

## Welcome to New St. Michael's Staff!

St. Michael's is thrilled to welcome to our staff five new part-time staff members. Together, their annual salaries and benefits will be slightly less than our 2011 budget for the salary/benefit package of Associate Rector.

**The Rev. Sue Joiner** – a United Church of Christ pastor, Sue will be doing non-sacramental clergy ministry with an emphasis in Adult Formation and Community-Building. Sue will also be in a discernment process towards hopeful ordination as an Episcopal priest.

**The Rev. Kristin Schultz** – a Lutheran pastor, Kristin will serve sacramentally under the Episcopal-Lutheran Concordat. She will be our Director of Family Ministries, with children and youth, and will also do some general clergy ministry.

**Francesca McDowell** – long our lead Godly Play teacher, Francesca will assist Kristin and the Family Ministry folk in a 1/5-time position.

**Deacon Judith Jenkins** – has been working for years as a volunteer, and now is being paid. In addition to general clergy ministry, Judith is looking after Outreach and Lay Pastoral Care ministries.

**The Rev. Susan Allison-Hatch** – is a volunteer priest, primarily serving the 5pm Sunday community and their worship. She also helps occasionally at other times with general clergy ministry. Together with a lay team, she is developing a fresh start and new direction for that community.

## Reflections & Invitations for Advent

It seems fitting that as I began work at St Michael's this fall, we immediately began planning for the season of Advent – the “new year” on the church calendar. I love the season of Advent – the music, the stories, the events that bring us together in the church.

I especially appreciate the way Advent calls us away from the excesses of the culture's celebration of Christmas, to something very different. From the time Halloween decorations are put away (or even before!), the culture of commerce is ramping up for the holidays. We are encouraged to buy the perfect gift for everyone we know – stocking stuffers for everyone in the household – decorations and food that will make the season perfect. Our expectations for this “most wonderful time of the year” can be high – family togetherness and beautiful things surrounding us and lots of food and music and events to invoke the “spirit of Christmas.”

In contrast, Advent calls us to be still. To be quiet and listen. To make space for what really matters: God coming into the world. It makes all the difference. Instead of constructing perfect experiences of Christmas, Advent invites us to see what is real, and love it as God does. Instead of engaging in frantic consumerism, Advent invites us to engage in real relationships with the people around us – the people God loves, the people for whom God has come into the world.

I don't mean that there is anything wrong with all the fun Christmas traditions and events. Breakfast with Santa – lighting the tree at the plaza – parties and baking and giving – all of these things can be wonderful ways to celebrate the season. As long as they don't become the focus of the season. As long as they don't become a burden. The invitation of Advent is to take a close look at these Christmas traditions and remove what is alienating us from God and our loved ones, rather than bringing us closer

How do we engage in this Spirit of Advent? One way is by engaging in the spiritual discipline of saying no. Saying no to those things which burden us rather than nourish us. Saying no to the excesses which surround us – excesses of spending and eating and doing too much.

Another way is to engage in Advent traditions of prayer and devotion, such as lighting candles in wreath or counting down days with a calendar and marking each day with prayer. Such devotional practice can draw our attention constantly back to God. It can help our hearts prepare, again and again, every day, for the coming of Christ.

St. Michael's would like to support all of our families in our Advent journey together. One way is to invite and encourage you to keep






worship at the center of your Advent and Christmas season. Gather with the Christian community as we hear the ancient stories and prepare ourselves, together, for the coming of Emmanuel – God with us.


We will celebrate the season of Advent with a series of intergenerational events. Everyone is invited – members, non-members, adults and kids of all ages – to these special events. The first is St. Michael's traditional Advent event, when we will make wreaths and share other crafts and activities to welcome the season of Advent. Another is to celebrate the feast of St. Nicholas, when we will make traditional St. Nicholas cookies and hear more about the "original" Santa Claus. Then on December 11 and 18, our adult education classes and parents are invited to join our Godly Play classes in the pavilion, to hear the stories and traditions of advent in a new way.

St. Michael's will also provide devotional materials for use at home during this season. Three different devotional booklets – two by beloved authors Henri Nouwen and Paula D'Arcy – will be available to pick up in the narthex throughout the season. For children, we have a special devotional project – a manger scene to set up at home, with devotions and stickers for each day of Advent. And for tweens and teens, a calendar with a brief thought for each day of Advent on the theme of "So, this is God with Us?" Choose one or more of these resources to accompany you and your family in the weeks leading up to Christmas.

I hope you will find ways to join the community at St. Michael's in preparing – as individuals and as the gathered Body of Christ – for a meaningful Christmas. God's blessings be with you however you celebrate and where you may god this Christmastime.

## Adoption of Anglican Covenant by Episcopal Church Unlikely

In response to the inclusion of homosexuals in ordained ministry and the development of same-gender rites of blessing in the Episcopal Church and elsewhere, portions of the Anglican Communion have advocated an Anglican Covenant.

This covenant would provide a process to discipline Communion member churches, and, if necessary, remove them from the Communion. A draft Covenant has been written and circulated to member churches for their consideration and possible adoption.

Our church's Standing Commission on Constitution and Canons has said that to adopt the current version of the Covenant "would significantly alter our current understanding of what it means to be an autonomous province."

For this reason, the Executive Council of the Episcopal Church recently decided to submit a resolution to General Convention next year that would have it state that the church is "unable to adopt the Anglican Covenant in its present form." In addition, the Presiding Bishop, who chairs the Executive Council, said that they were also concerned "that all people of this church might be included in the life of the church."

The 77th meeting of General Convention July 5-12, 2012 will decide whether to pass, amend and pass, or reject the Executive Council's resolution. ♪

## Financial News for September

October's financial statements were not ready in time for this edition of the Angelus, however they will be posted in the Parish Hall by the time you receive this Angelus. Below is the financial news for period ending 9/30/2011.

In September we experienced a loss totaling (\$12,267) bringing our year to date loss to (\$4,225). This resulted in the Church having to borrow from its line of credit due to negative cash flow in the Operating Fund. Primarily this is due to pledges not being submitted timely.

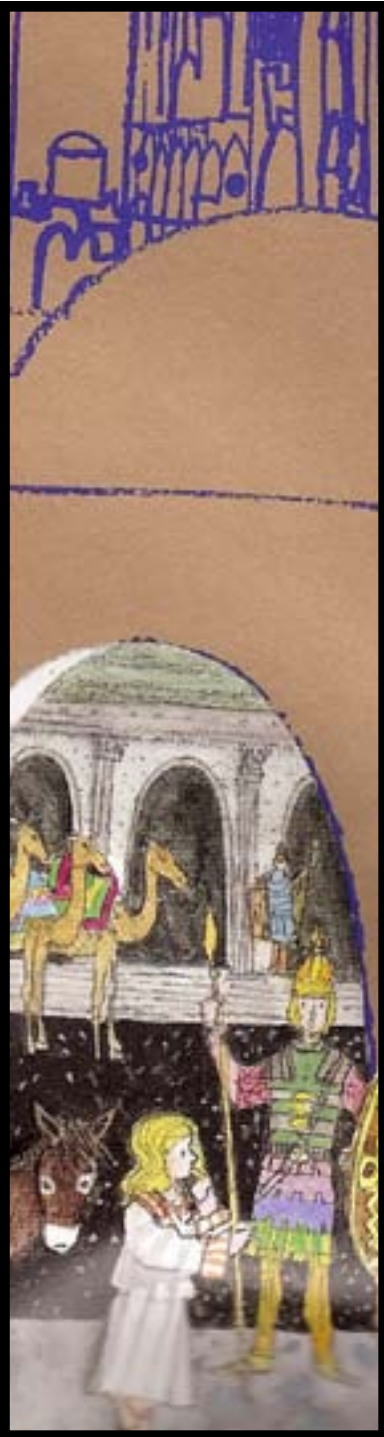
Soon you will be receiving a letter from our Treasurer Jim Moffitt, urging you to submit your 2011 pledge payments in full no later than mid-December. This will ensure that we minimize the need to borrow additional amounts from our line of credit as well as paying off the balance previously borrowed. We have many contributors who pay their pledge annually. If possible, we ask those pledgers to pay their annual 2011 pledge by the end of November.

## Nets for Life

### A Partnership for Malaria Prevention in Africa

Nets for Life – A partnership for Malaria prevention in Africa and sponsored by Episcopal Relief and Development is once more making a difference by asking for our crucial support which will help children, families, and whole communities move from sickness to strength. NetsForLife brings together faith – based organizations and private donors in a collaborative initiative focused on eliminating malaria in Africa.

Every day, nearly 2,000 children under five years of age die from malaria in sub-Saharan Africa. With our help, insecticide treated nets will be delivered to families and communities in need. A deadly infectious disease transmitted by a mosquito bite can actually be prevented with an insecticide-treated net.

## Scenes From St. Martin's

Henri Nouwen once observed, “we will never believe we have anything to give unless there is someone who is able to receive.” That kind of giving happens every Sunday morning at St. Martin's as members of the Congregation of St. Martin's gather in worship and welcome new people—both those who live in houses and those who live on the streets—into their midst. Our greeter lives on the streets—except in the winter when he moves to the West Side Shelter. Our altar server moves from apartment to motel to shelter depending on the cash available. Our music man has just moved to an apartment quite far from St. Martin's. He gets up early on Sundays to catch the Central bus and hopes that a ride is waiting for him at the Bus Station. Like any congregation, we have our regular readers and our strong singers and our fervent prayers.

It's taken some time to build this community of worship, but now it's beginning to feel like it really is the Church of St. Martin's—a place where people who live in houses gather at the table with people who live on the streets and a church where people who live on the streets feel at home. One of the ways people who live in houses can help this little congregation is to join us in worship. Experience the hospitality of the people at St. Martin's. Be there to receive the gifts this community of people who live on the edge have to offer. Our church services begin at 8:00 a.m. every Sunday. We have breakfast afterwards. Come and see! ☞

## Live at Five

A congregation within a congregation, a church within a church, the Five O' Clock worshipping community began its third year with an outdoor service celebrating the Feast of St. Francis including a blessing of the animals. It was a fitting beginning to our third year and grew out of our Soundings Conversation at which we shared the dreams we hold for our worshipping community, the core values we hope to live by and the visions we have for where our Five O' Clock community will be one day.

On a Saturday late in September, over twenty people from the Five O' Clock worshipping community and from the larger community of St. Michael's as well, gathered to take soundings on where we are as a worshipping community and where we hope to be in the future. By the end of the morning, the walls of the Parish Hall were covered with our work. We are a worshipping community built on and blending two powerful traditions: our Anglican heritage and our New Mexican roots. We draw on both these traditions in our prayers, our music and



our celebrations. We sing in English and in Spanish and we pray in both languages too. But you don't need to speak Spanish to participate in the service. We treasure our welcoming, inclusive and diverse nature and the simple and informal cast to our worship. People can come as they are and they do!

Our Soundings Conversation was just the beginning of our discernment work. In the weeks and months ahead, we will continue to explore where God is calling our community and we will continue to determine together how we make decisions for our worshipping community, how we best reach out to the community outside our walls, and what it means for us to be church together and for us to be an integral part of the community of St. Michael's.

## Library News: Book Reviews

Simon May, *Love: A History*, (2011), call number 128.4609 May 2011, summarizes Western concepts of divine and human love from the Hebrews to Marcel Proust. May criticizes Western concepts of human love as having divine attributes such as being unconditional, eternal and selfless, and even replacing God. May presents his own philosophy of human love as a search for what he calls “ontological rootedness,” or a sense that the beloved (person or thing) makes the lover’s life more secure and real. Read May’s book before you try to pledge “unconditional, eternal” love to anyone.

Walter Brueggemann’s *Collected Sermons*, call number 252.058 Bru 2011, expands our collection of Protestant theologians. Brueggemann is a scholar of the Old Testament who has found a home in St. Timothy’s Episcopal Church in Cincinnati. His sermons, which date from 1972 through 2009, are designed to make Old Testament stories relevant to modern life.

We have also acquired some more books dealing with the results of the search for the historical Jesus. Herbert W. Funk, *Honest to Jesus*, (1996), call number 232.908 Fun 1996, is a well-informed discussion by one of the writers in the Jesus Seminar, who attempts to place Jesus’ teachings in their historical context for a modern audience.

Ricky Alan Mayotte, *The Complete Jesus* (1997), call number 226.052 May 1997, is a collection of the “sayings of Jesus,” compiled from the New Testament, the Christian Gnostic writings and New Testament Apocrypha. The author deliberately includes many sayings which were not included in the accepted gospels of the New Testament.

Finally, Alan Jacobs, *When Jesus Lived in India* (2009), call number 232.901 Jac 2009, is a speculative commentary on what Jesus may have been doing during the early years of his life, which have not been documented by any written sources. ❧
