Dear friends,

This fall I'd like to invite you to reflect on the ways in which St. Michael's has had an impact on your life. Every other Sunday this October and November, a member will share their story about this with the congregation. We're doing this in order to draw a direct connection between the ways in which this community affects us and our financial support for it. I'd like to share my story with you, but first, some quick facts.

- ◆ We receive no other financial income other than pledges and gifts from parishioners. We raise some \$700,000 every year to support our staff, buildings, worship, and programs.
- ◆ We have a mortgage on our new building that so wonderfully houses all our ministries. About \$620,000 still has to be secured in pledges to the New Building Fund in order to pay it off, and avoid the eventuality of making payments out of the operating fund.
- ◆ Pledges are essential - not just spontaneous giving in the plate - because they enable us to plan for paying our bills, just like your salary does at home. Many of our members do not pledge, and we'd like to raise the number of pledging households to include virtually everyone.
- ◆ The average pledge per household is about \$2,000 per year. How much should you pledge? That's between you and God, but I ask you to consider your overall giving proportionally - what percentage of your income might express the importance that St. Michael's has in your life?

Which brings me to my original subject, why St. Michael's is important to me. I came to this parish as a young man, 32 years old. We have raised our family here, I have been through many ups and downs, and have journeyed with many of you through hard and joyous times. Through it all, I have felt that I am in a kind of close-knit village, where our common humanity and our specific




circumstances are held together in loving support. There is nowhere else that I have this in my life, and it sustains me every day.

When I am with you on Sunday, singing a psalm, looking out from the altar, giving communion to you, I know that we are intimately connected in the Spirit. Sometimes the air becomes electric, charged with Presence. This helps me remember, in the dark times, that God is real and close at hand, and that I can call upon this Presence at any time.

I learn things about myself, about God, about life, from you, from the scriptures, from the problems we go through together, and above all, from our sincere efforts to live more faithfully. I am a better Christian because of you, because of the worship and study and conversations we share. There is nowhere else that this happens for me. How valuable is that? It is immeasurable.

These are some of the reasons I pledge a percentage of my income to both the operating fund and the New Building fund. What are yours?

Godly Play ages 4-11

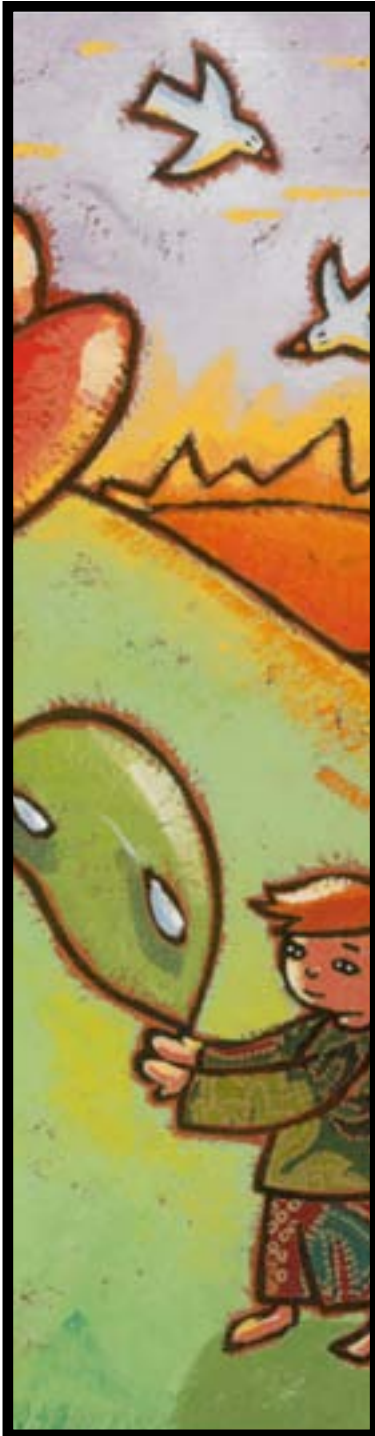

Education for Ministry (EFM) Fall Classes

Are you interested in an in depth study in a small group where theological reflection connecting scripture and tradition to our everyday lives happens every week? EFM, a study opportunity for laypersons from the School of Theology, University of the South in Sewanee Tennessee, is that class.

EFM is a four year program which includes studies in Old Testament, New Testament, Church History, and Contemporary Theologies and Liturgies that provide a foundation for our own faith development and ministries. While EFM is not designed for a graduate degree or ordination, it does give the opportunity to experience the study materials from one of our Episcopal seminaries.

Each year includes 34 weeks of study and worship in a seminar setting with no more than twelve persons and a mentor. The seminar sessions also include Theological Reflection which teaches us to explore our questions and lives and express our faith in day-to-day events while looking at the sources of Scripture, Tradition, Culture and Issues, Life Experiences and our own personal Positions.

We wish to honor the tradition in New Mexico laid down and exemplified over the years by Susan Butler.

There are currently two EFM groups in Albuquerque. Cheri Winter will mentor Susan Butler's Monday evening class this year, which will begin Monday August 22, 2011, at St. Marks on the Mesa.

Financial News for July

The Financial news for period ending July 2011 is reported below. Although we experienced a loss in July totaling (\$5,695), year to date we continue with a surplus totaling \$19,132. Although we have a surplus, the Church continues to struggle with poor cash flow which totaled a negative (\$2,640) for our operating fund. We were able to borrow this amount from our line of credit at US Bank. However, we continue to need new and increased pledges in order to build up our operating cash to a health surplus. During the ongoing and recent economic struggles on a global scale, it is a challenging time for us all. We continue to be very blessed to have our parishioners generously give which keeps St. Michael's faith community and ministries active and growing. Thank you and we pray and keep hope for better times to come.

Sundays at St. Martin's

Every Sunday at 8:00 a.m. people who live on the streets and people who live in houses gather around the communion table in the back room of the Susan Sager Day Shelter at St. Martin's Hospitality Center. Each service begins with the words of the psalmist:

"This is the day that the Lord has made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it." Glad we are—glad to be together and glad to be alive. We sing songs, say prayers, hear the Word of God, offer one another the Peace and then join at the table. As we do we catch a glimpse of the rainbow Reign of God Jesus proclaims. Our greeter has lived on the streets for a long time. He welcomes the strangers among us. Sometimes our music leader comes from the street and sometimes from St. Michael's; sometimes the altar server is from the streets and sometimes lives in a house. After worship, we gather in front of the serving window, say a blessing and then share another meal. Six times a year St. Michael's provides that meal.

There are many ways you can be a part of the miracle that is St. Martin's. You can help us build church together by worshipping and ministering with not to the people of the streets. You can be part of the St. Michael's Sunday feeding team. You can volunteer, as Deacon Judith does, on weekdays. You can donate clothes (especially socks and underwear), backpacks, soaps and shampoos, books and Bibles. Starting September 7, you can buy a cup of coffee (or a pound or two) at our new coffee shop at 2nd and Lomas. It's Not Too Early to Think Christmas!

Maya Works will again join St. Michael's alternative Holiday shopping options. On Sunday, November 20th, we will be in the parish hall with our beautiful traditional and contemporary weavings and unique beadwork produced by a Guatemalan women's artisan coop. Guatemala still hasn't recovered from the devastating tropical storms that hit last year, destroying crops and infrastructure. As a result, the UN reports that 49.3% of children under 5 are malnourished. Among the Maya, our artisans, that figure rises to 80%.

Here in New Mexico, thousands also face food insecurity. Casa San Miguel continues to see an increase in clientele which means that we will need a lot more food. This year Casa San Miguel will use profits from Maya Works sales to purchase that food so that all are fed for the Holidays.

MayaWorks is a network of women's craft coops that provide their members income to feed and clothe their children. Through partnership with Behrhorst Partners for Development, the women and children also receive access to secondary school scholarships (especially for girls); birthing clinics; elementary schools, books and teachers; clean water projects and smoke-free cook stoves. These save lives and improve the quality of life for entire villages.

75 cents of every dollar spent goes directly to the artisans. The women themselves set the prices of the goods and are paid before the merchandise even leaves the villages. A small price increase is added to defray shipping and project development. The U.S. office is almost all volunteer. ☺



Library News: Book Reviews

Lighting the Candle, Call Number 283.791 Sto 1961, is a history of the “Episcopal Church in the upper Rio Grande,” written by the late bishop James M. Stoney in 1961. Throughout the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, heroic clergy such as Parson Tays, Rev. Henry Forrester, Preacher Lewis and Bishop Stoney struggled to establish the Church’s presence in a frontier setting, despite vast distances, a chronic lack of funds and clergy, and the overwhelming influence of the Roman Catholic Church. This book is a fascinating picture of where we came from.

Nicholas Humphrey, *Soul Dust*, Call Number 126 Hum 204, explores the relationship between illusion, consciousness, soul and belief in immortality. Humphrey, who claims that he does not believe in supernatural beings such as God, nonetheless sets the stage for human preoccupation with religion. A very humanistic view of what is going on in our brains.

Jonathan Wright, *Heretics: The Creation of Christianity from the Gnostics to the Modern Church*, Call Number 273 Wri 2011, is a lively account of Christian orthodoxies and heresies from the early Church fathers in Alexandria to the Second Vatican Council. It is this reviewer’s favorite.

Two recent books on the theology of sexuality are important additions to the library collection:

Theology and Sexuality: Classic and Contemporary Readings, edited by Eugene F. Rogers, Jr., Call Number 233.5 The 2002, is a collection of original sources and scholarly reflections on the role of sexuality in Christian thought and practice.

Gray Temple, *Gay Unions: In the light of Scripture, Tradition and Reason*, Call Number 261.835 Tem 2004, is a contemporary Episcopal argument in favor of recognizing gay couples within the church community. ❧
