**Godly Play:** Godly Play is based upon the recognition that children have an innate sense of the presence of God. All they lack is the appropriate language to help them identify and express it so it can be explored and strengthened. The Godly Play approach teaches classical Christian language in a way that enhances the child's authentic experience of God so it can contribute to the creative life of the child and the world. Godly Play teaches children the art of using Christian language - parable, sacred story, silence and liturgical action - helping them become more fully aware of the mystery of God's presence in their lives.

**Rite 13 and Journey to Adulthood:** The Journey to Adulthood is a complete youth ministry program of spiritual formation for 6th-12th grades. It uses Bible study, prayer, rites of passage, outreach ministries and both serious and playful activities to underscore its two guiding principles: 1. Manhood and womanhood are free gifts from God. 2. Adulthood must be learned.

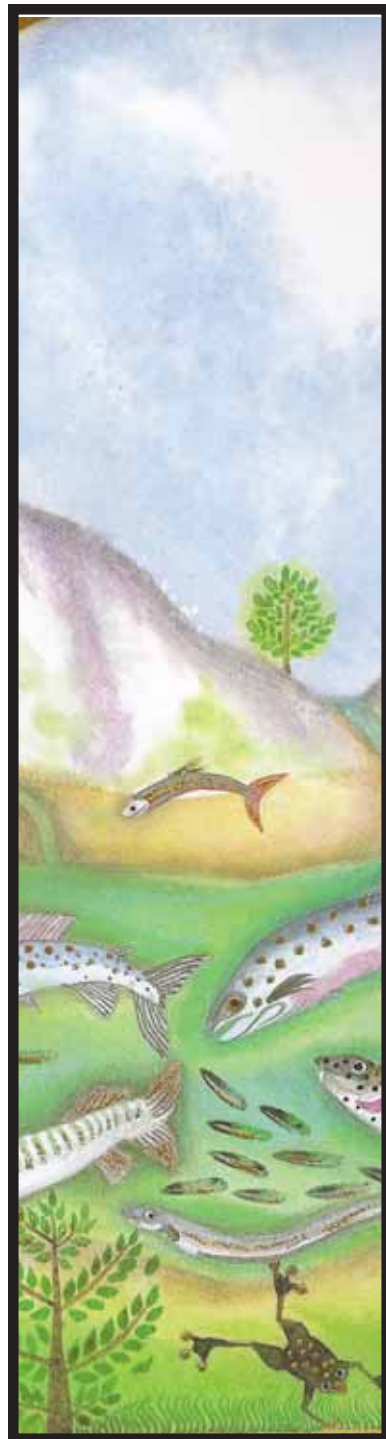

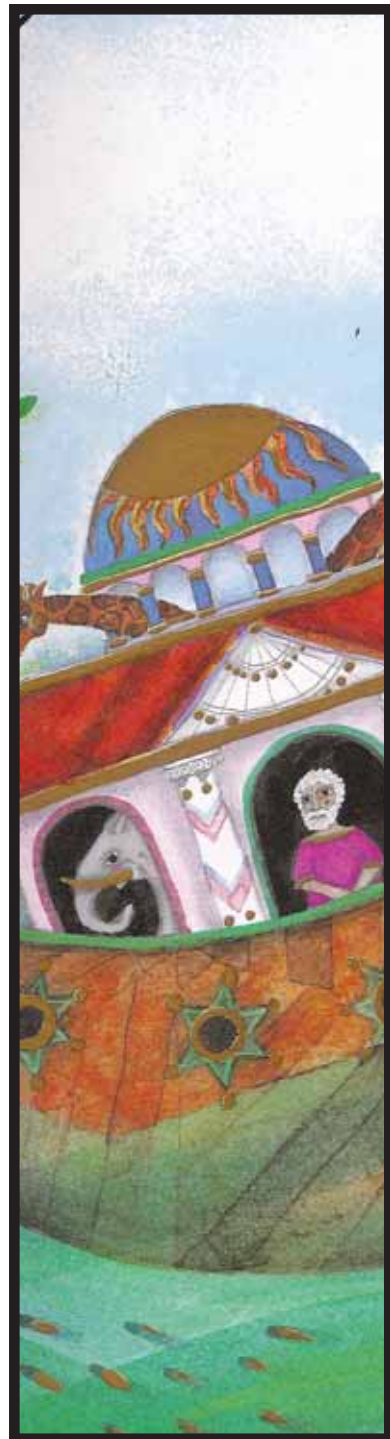
## Michaelmas Fiesta: Carnival, Potluck, & Art Contest for Children Sunday, October 3rd

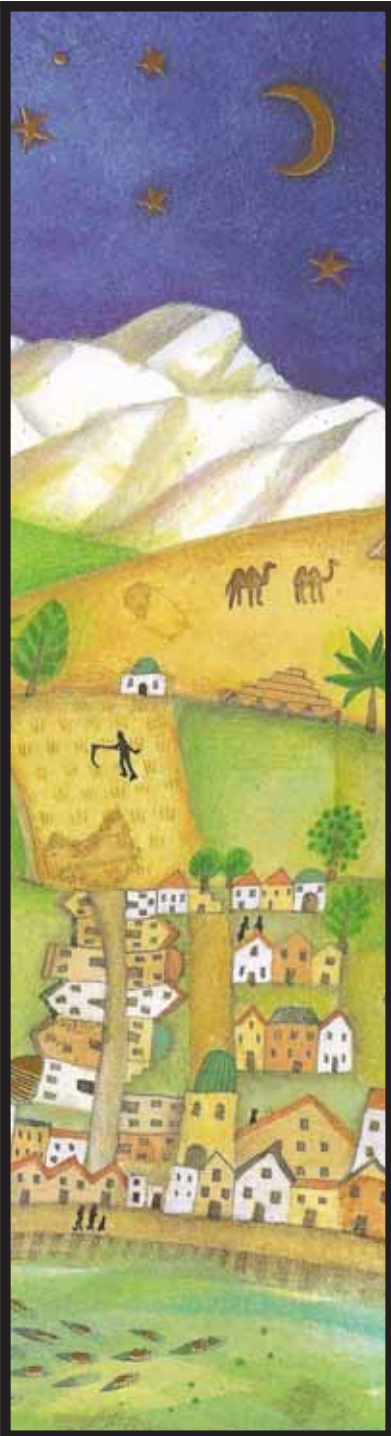

## Highlights of the August 2010 Vestry Meeting

- Fr. Christopher reported that this is an especially busy time of year.
- o There are last-minute concerns as the New Ministry Complex nears completion.
  - o The Interfaith Ministry is dealing with immigration issues.
  - o Preparation is being made for Fr. Brian's upcoming sabbatical.

Treasurer Jim Moffitt reported that the financial position at the end of

July was good, but a slowdown in pledge payments usually occurs during August through October each year. Therefore the Finance Committee was authorized to borrow up to \$33,576 for operating cash needs from several specifically designated funds on a short-term basis. Other action items approved by the Vestry were a payment of \$4,800 for repair of a gas leak, and authorization of up to \$75,000 for change orders on the New Ministry Complex contract. A more detailed report from the Finance Committee can be found elsewhere in *The Angelus*.

Other items of interest:

- o A plan will be drawn up for landscaping the Stack property within the budget allowed.
- o Counters are still needed. Each counter would be asked to donate about two hours per month. Volunteers may contact a member of the Vestry or Daniel Borrego.
- o It is time to consider new candidates for the 2011 Vestry as well as new delegates to convention. ☺

## The Nomads of San Gabriel's are Moving Again!

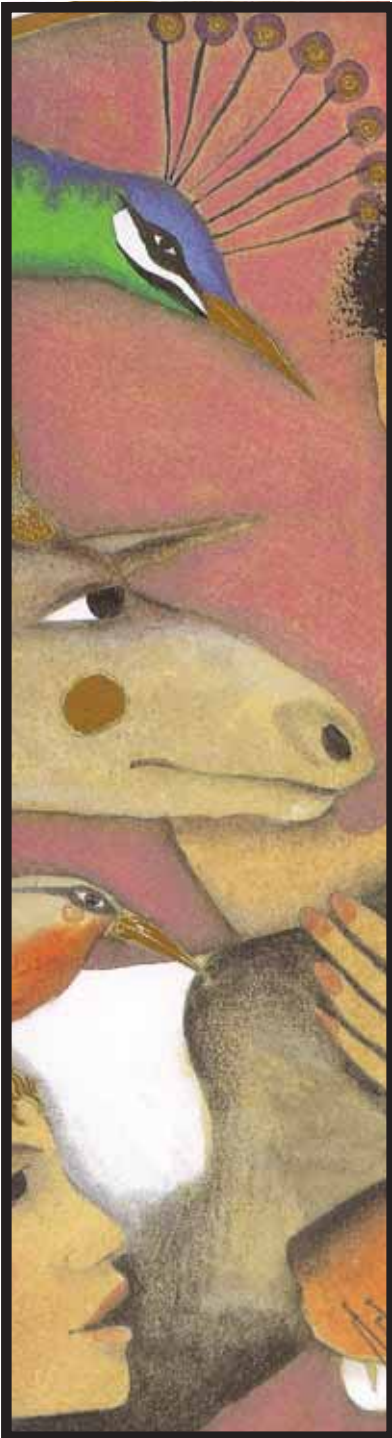

## All Angels Episcopal Day School

Change is good, right? It is the beginning of a new school year at All Angels, and it causes me to reflect on how much my twin boys have grown since they began their preschool journey a couple of years ago.

I, like many other mothers, was terrified to send my little ones off to preschool, but I knew it was time. I remember my school tour with Miss Nancy Nerderman very well. It began with watching the kids playing and laughing on the playground. It was a very warm and happy place, but the four and five year olds looked so big (and a little scary) to me. After the bell rang, we went into chapel. I was amazed to see even the two year olds demonstrating good chapel manners. When they returned to their classroom, they each sat quietly on their own square of carpet and listened attentively to their morning lesson. My boys had never been that still or attentive even during a Baby Einstein video! Naturally, I began to worry that my boys were too young or too immature perhaps. However, Miss Nancy assured me that my boys would also be able to do all of these things after a few months of school. I was extremely impressed with the school routines like calendar time and projects the children were doing. I also liked the balance of learning time with play and social time. I knew All Angels was the right school for them, but it was just hard for me to let go.

As soon as Max and Will began preschool, I saw big changes at home. They could sit at the dinner table longer. They made new

friends easily. They were more patient with each other. They always talked about the things they learned in the Rabbit Room, and they wanted to learn more about them at the library. Then, after a few months, I visited the classroom- and sure enough- the boys were able to sit on **their** little carpet square and listen to the lesson too!

In their second year at All Angels, they became Sunbeams. In a matter of days, they were potty trained (after much work at home and in the Rabbit Room). They started drawing lots of pictures and writing letters. Their love for learning continued to grow. They stopped crying when I dropped them off in the morning. At the beginning of the year, Will would say, "Mom, could you stay for chapel... for Max? He needs you." Then by the end of the year, Will changed it to, "I don't need you to stay for chapel anymore, Mom." Ouch- that hurt- change can be hard too.

This year is their third and final school year at All Angels. Now they are Foresters and **they** are the big, scary kids! I feel blessed that they are able to be a part of All Angels Day School. It is such a special place for them. It saddens me to think that they have only a few more times to ring the chapel bell and lead the prayers when it is their leader day, but I am so excited to see how they will grow this year. Change **is** good. Max reminded me of that yesterday when he wrote me a note all by himself that said, "I (heart) U MAMA." Wow, what a long way they have come!

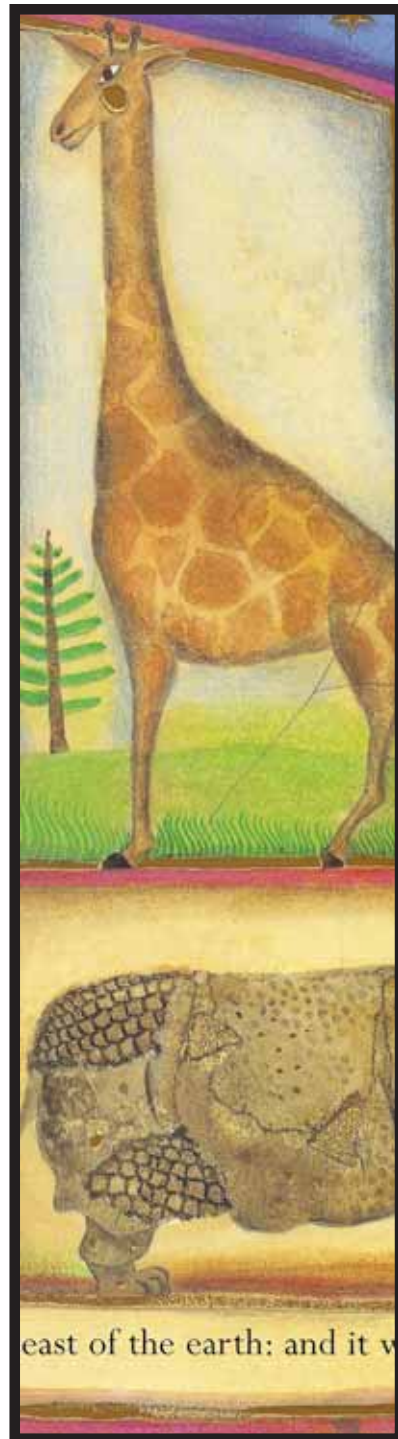

This parable of Bruce Barton has provided many a guidepost through the years for giving and living. Perhaps it can serve us also. There are two seas in Palestine. The Sea of Galilee receives but does not keep the Jordan River. The giving and receiving go on in equal measure. The other sea is shrewder, hoarding its income jealously. It will not be tempted by a generous impulse. Every drop it receives it greedily keeps. The Sea of Galilee gives and lives. The other sea gives nothing; it is called the Dead Sea.
